

MEMORANDUM TO THE CONFERENCE

Subject: Weinberger, Sec'y of HEW v. Weber, No. 74-850


We granted cert to the Ninth Circuit in this matter to review a district court rule providing for the "automatic" referral of certain types of cases such as social security cases to federal magistrates. The Solicitor General contends that such a procedure conflicts with Fed. R. Civ. P. 53(b): "A reference to a master shall be the exception and not the rule."

Respondent Weber who is proceeding pro se has no interest in this issue--he doesn't care who "decides" his case. He did not appear in the Ninth Circuit and has advised the Clerk that he will not appear here. Accordingly, it would appear necessary that the Court appoint an attorney to argue amicus curiae in support of the judgment below. We have followed that procedure in similar cases.

I propose that we appoint Mr. Peter D. Ehrenhaft of Washington, D. C. to argue the case before us. As some of you may know, Mr. Ehrenhaft was a law clerk to Chief Justice Warren. He is presently a partner with the firm of Fried, Frank, Harris, Shriver and Kampelman.

The appointment should be made in this Monday's order list since we have a motion by the Solicitor General to dispense with printing an appendix presently pending before us.
